he Valmadonna Collection is the largest private collection of Hebrew books from around the world. The age of its contents spans a thousand years. The owner of this collection, Mr Jack Lunzer z"l, brought it to Sothebys auction house in New York in 2009. It was the major Jewish scholarly event of the year. I, along with thousands of others, went to view it. When I walked into the rooms where the collection was displayed and saw, from floor to ceiling, shelves upon shelves of books, I was deeply impacted.

As I looked closer, I saw that the books had been displayed in order of the country in which they had been written or published. From Amsterdam, Paris, Izmir, Bombay, Ferrara, Calcutta, London, Shanghai, Alexandria and on and on...

Seeing it displayed this way I thought: where have we not lived? What language have we not spoken? What culture have we not absorbed into our national psyche? But cultures change, languages change, and customs are adjusted. Seeing these books displayed by country made me realise that the one constant in the Jewish diaspora – the one element that has always accompanied us throughout our sojourns – has been our Torah. No matter where we have lived in this world, no matter the languages we have spoken, we managed to study, write and publish Torah. We immersed ourselves in its thought and shared its teachings. We taught our children – whether we were in Berlin or Baghdad – the high value we placed on literacy and meaningful questioning. It is our Torah that has been our one constant comrade in our journeys throughout the ages. And it is our Torah that will bring us into the future.

But it must be a Torah that brings us into the world, not one that forces us to close ourselves away from it. It is a Torah that answers our questions through encouraging exploration rather than pretailored solutions. It is a Torah that, as it always has, brings us the ecstasy of discovery. That is the Torah that was and is, as King

Solomon wrote (Proverbs, 1:9), our "graceful escort" through time and space.

Shabuot is a time to celebrate the giving of the Torah and to reflect on the role that the Torah has played in Jewish history and culture. It is a time to renew our commitment to the values and principles that the Torah represents and to rekindle our passion for learning and studying it.

In this book of essays on Shabuot, we explore the many facets of the Torah's influence on our lives and its meaning within our people. We also delve into the rich aspects and traditions of Shabuot and explore its significance in the context of Jewish life. We examine the ways in which the Torah has inspired the Jewish people throughout history and explore its continuing relevance in the modern world.

I am thankful to Sina Kahen for his undying dedication to making the Ḥabura a thriving centre for Torah study and for the cultivation of our unique Sepharadi heritage. We would not be able to do any of it without him. May he continue to see *naḥat* from his work and care.
